On behalf of The Trust Board of Magna Learning Partnership, I wish you all the very warmest of welcomes back to the new academic year. In particular, to those of you new to the Trust as a member of staff, a new pupil or student and to our new school, we wish you all much success and happiness in the coming year and beyond. I also want to give a really special welcome back to all the children and young people who have not been able to attend school or college since 20th March. We will be delighted to see you all this week and whilst we can't pretend this is a 'normal' start to the year, we want to do all we can to make it a happy one.

Today we welcome Pembroke Park Primary School into Magna Learning Partnership. The school joins us from Salisbury Plain Academies and we are really delighted to provide the school with a very local home. The school is led by Mrs Aliki Constantopoulou; as Interim Headteacher she will be in post until Easter 2021 and we aim to appoint a permanent Headteacher by Christmas.

Most children from Pembroke Park move to Sarum Academy for secondary education and we aim to build strong relationships between the two schools over the coming years, for the benefit of all families.

We also have some changes of leadership in two of the secondary schools from this term. Parents, your school or college will be providing you with the detailed information you need for your children's safe return. Routines for this will be well established in our academies.

In classrooms, face masks are not advised as they can impede communication and learning. However, should the local health situation change this guidance will be reviewed. Please do pay careful attention to the information sent out by your school and ensure that your sons and daughters understand the guidelines and protocols which are designed to minimise the risk for everyone.

Finally, huge congratulations to all those students who received public examination results last month. We were all relieved and pleased with the government decision to use centre assessed grades for both GCSE and A Level results. As a consequence, there were many happy smiling faces on 20th August when GCSEs were released and finally, much relief for our A Level students who were able to secure their first choice destinations, whether this was university, apprenticeship or employment.

I also want to say thank you to the dedicated staff in our schools and college. Back in May and June they worked exceptionally hard to ensure that their predictions for students were professional and accurate. It has been a pleasure to see that hard work support our young people as they move onto the next stage of their education and working life.

This term, our objective in MLP is a simple one; we want to see all our children and young people back in school and college and enjoying their learning. We all look forward to being able to support your sons and daughters through this academic year.

### **Learning through Lockdown**



This was coupled with more creative tasks in the Wednesday Weekly bulletin.
